

a message from senior pastor, Jacob Heine

There is an occasion for everything, and a time for every activity under heaven... ~Ecclesiastes 3:1~

Like me, I am sure you have heard someone say (or maybe even said it yourself), no one likes change. That is absolutely true for a change that we don't like. When someone we love dies, we most certainly do not like that change in our lives. When people we care about move away, we mourn and don't like the change in relationship this brings. When we lose a job, we do not like the change in income and the change that such an upheaval brings.

However, when it is a change we desire or want it is certainly something we like. At a wedding we rejoice in the change of a new member that is welcomed into the family. - Adult Choir This non-audition vocal choir usually sings music in 2- or 4-part harmony and participates at least twice a month
 in worship (mainly in traditional, but occasionally in contemporary). Rehearsals are Thursdays, 7:15-8:30pm, in the choir
 loft/balcony, beginning Sept. 7.
- Praise Team If your musical interests lean toward Christian contemporary music in a band setting, then explore what our
 Praise Team has to offer during any rehearsal every Wednesday at 7:30pm. We always have a need for vocalists (lead
 or harmony who feel comfortable singing into a mic in front of the congregation); instrumentalists proficient in guitar
 (acoustic, electric or bass), drum kit, or keyboard/synth; and tech-savvy people who are willing to learn our sound board or
 screen software or cameras for streaming.
- Beginner Bell Training Do you understand rhythm and counting in music? Even if you don't know all the notes, you can learn
 to ring handbells! If you want to learn the basics of handbell ringing, come for a 6-week beginners session starting
 Thursday, Sept 7, 5:30-6:00pm in the sanctuary. For ages middle school through adult with some knowledge of rhythm and
 note reading.
- Alleluia Ringers Bell Choir Rehearsals for our advanced bell choir begin *Thursday, Sept 7, 6:00-7:10pm* in the sanctuary. If you have experience ringing bells and would like to be on a list of substitute ringers, please contact Linda Meyer.

MONTHLY FINANCIAL RESULTS

Update from our treasurer. . .

- Donations for June were \$96,375 and expenses were \$121,1540 resulting in a
 <u>Negative</u> balance for the month of \$24,778.
- YTD Donations are \$542,973 and expenses are \$592,386 resulting in a net YTD Negative balance of \$29,415.
- YTD donations are \$20,024 below 2022 and \$101,240 below projected.
- YTD expenses are \$91,607 higher than 2022 but \$43,087 below budget.

Our Faith family has over the years lost three women, all from one family...Lota Pinter, the mother; Tina Fay, a daughter; and Betty Ramsey, a daughter and a sister. This mother and two of her daughters all suffered from ALSP, a rare, progressive neurological disease which has no cure.

ALSP is the acronym for <u>A</u>dult-Onset <u>L</u>eukoencephalopathy with Axonal <u>S</u>pheroids and <u>P</u>igmented Glia. What does this mean?

Leukoencephalopathy is the alteration of white matter, one type of brain tissue that affects learning and brain



functions and coordinates communication between different regions in the brain. White matter consists of axons, or nerve fibers, covered by myelin, a substance that insulates and protects. The axons transmit nerve impulses throughout the body. A spheroid is a result of swelling of axons in the brain. The spheroids, or damaged axons, disrupt messages being sent in the brain. Damage to glia cells is believed to contribute to the neurological symptoms ALSP patients experience.

The cause of ALSP is the mutation of the CSF1R gene. Without a normally-functioning CSF-1 Receptor structural changes to the nerve cell occur. It takes only one copy of a mutated CSF1 Receptor to cause symptoms and to diagnose ALSP. Also, if a parent has a mutation each child has a 50% chance of inheriting the mutation. The risk of inheritance is the same for males and females. Also, the altered gene can be the result of a new mutation in the affected person.

ALSP symptoms vary from patient to patient, can even vary between patients from the same family, and worsen over time. Cognitive symptoms include memory problems, dementia, confusion, and loss of speech. Behavioral symptoms include mood and personality changes, lack of self-control, poor judgment, and depression. Motor symptoms include tight, weak muscles, muscle spasms and tremors, difficulty walking or slowness of movements, and lack of coordination. Other possible symptoms can be a change in vision, difficulty swallowing, or slurred speech. Many of these ALSP symptoms look much like other disease processes, making diagnosis difficult.

There are no FDA-approved treatments for ALSP. Current treatment options do not reverse or "fix" damage, but rather are used to manage symptoms. Continued research is very important to further advance our understanding of this disease and to develop more effective treatment options.

A bone marrow transplant procedure is the most promising, possible treatment to slow down the ALSP disease symptoms.

A national ALSP 5K run will be held in Raleigh, NC, on September 9 to raise awareness of ALSP and to raise funds for research and support for patients of ALSP and their families. We are organizing a Topeka Team walk at Lake Shawnee's Ensley Gardens on that same day, September 9. We will be at the shelter at the parking lot entrance to the gardens from 8-11 am. Water, snacks, and educational material will be available there that day. You can walk at your own pace, any distance. Other options include walking any place and any time...you can walk at the place and time of your choice! You can register as a virtual walker for only \$20...which will help raise funds to support research and to support ALSP patients and their families. Continue to check the Weekend Updates for new information as it is released.

Support Doorstep in August!

August is Faith Lutheran's month to stock Doorstep's food pantry.

In July, Faith's Christian Service Team passed out grocery bags for non perishable food donations.

Return the filled bags (please double bag heavy items) and return to church. Tables will be set up to display donations through August 14. After that, food can be placed in the Doorstep box in the gathering nook. Last year, church members contributed over 1500 pounds of food in August!

Non perishable food might include mac-n-cheese, canned soups or vegetables or fruit, one pound packages of rice, dried beans or pasta, dry cereal, Spaghetti O's or peanut butter and jelly.

In addition to meals from the food pantry and gently used clothes from the clothing room, Doorstep provides emergency assistance




to families in crisis. Working with other local agencies, Doorstep offers help with basic health needs, gas vouchers and bus passes, and homeless prevention assistance.

Faith volunteers at Doorstep


